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Dear Friends,

As I watch the transition of power in Washington DC, I am filled with so much emotion. I know some of you are delighted and some of you are heartbroken. Our country is so divided. Christians are divided. All this breaks my heart.

How are we to be church in this new time of transition? How are we to let go of the anger that might consume us or the apprehension over what will happen next? How are we to build bridges over the canyon that divides our country, our cities and even each other?

We start in prayer, deep, quiet, open, honest prayer. Honest prayer requires each of us to bear our heart to God speaking of our concerns, our fears, our pain. Honest prayer asks God to show us how our behavior and words cause division. Honest prayer asks for God's forgiveness and guidance. Then we sit in quiet and listen for God's direction. We open ourselves so that God's Spirit might wash over us. We become ready to receive God's wisdom and to respond to our God in faithfulness and hope.

Following prayer, the next step is to become better listeners. We must not fear differing opinions, but rather welcome them and seek to understand. We must learn to not interrupt or close our ears and hearts to differing voices. We must let going of "winning" the argument. We must hone our ability to listen to comprehend.

In Jesus Christ there can be no division. We are one body, with one purpose which is to glorify God in all things. We are to share the gospel of Jesus Christ which finds its roots in love, love for God, love for neighbors, love for God's creation. We are to set aside our selfish ways and seek justice for all God's people. We are to stand up for God's truth which we come to understand more fully in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Healing and unity are Christian qualities which when sought and brought can bring light to our darkened world. Unconditional love is the blood that must course through our veins into our relationships. Humility is the framework upon which we must build our faith and life work.

Friends, we pray for peace each Sunday. I pray for it every day. Peace and unity must start with each of us. How we choose to be in relationship with others matters.

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To be instruments of God's peace we must first find peace and unity within ourselves. This can be difficult to do. Yet, if we have not found this internal peace and unity, we will have a hard time building bridges and bringing peace into the world. Be willing to do some self-evaluation. Find peace first within yourself.

My invitation to you all is to be in honest prayer with God. Seek peace within yourself and seek respect and honesty in all your relationships. We are not called to like or agree with everyone. We are called though with no exception to love and respect all people.

As I work toward being a better instrument of God's peace and unity, I do so with humility and a sharpened self-awareness of myself and the ways I sow inclusion and unity and the means by which I sow division and disharmony. I invite you to join with me on this journey.

Together as one body we can continue to become stronger and stronger at being God's voice for peace, hope and justice.

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*across cultural lines by embracing ethnicity and diversity.* To that end One People has worked to plan and carry out the annual Juneteenth celebration , worked on the SWCI Unity festival, participated in DAAHC activities, done neighborhood walks with the Delaware Police Department, and participated in First Friday events. We have monthly meetings at FPC and involve several members of our congregation. All are welcome when we start meeting again.

Pastor Deb officiated at Oak Grove Cemetary for Dick's graveside service on January 5, 2021.
