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Dear Friends,

I've been doing some reading and thinking around the Genesis 2 passage for a coming sermon. It is the second account of the creation story. In it one reads of God creating the world, heavens and earth, land and sky, rivers, and streams. God creates man/human from the dust of the earth and breathes life into this new being. Isn't that a lovely image? It is so personal and so intimate, God sharing breath and life with this human creation.

The Hebrew word for man is Adamah which translates as ground or earth. I love what one writer wrote which was that the human creation is not only created from the dirt of the earth but is then called to live on that earth and care for it. (my words) From the point of creation, Adam was given the responsibility to name and then care for all of what God created. Adam along with Eve became God's chosen stewards of the earth.

As I think about God breathing life not only into the first human, but into each of our lives, I also recognize that the responsibility of stewardship has been passed on generation after generation to us. We then have the responsibility to pass it on to our children and they to their children.

FPC is an Earth Care Congregation. We continue to make changes in how we interact with God's creation. And yet there still are so many ways that we can improve on our care of God's creation. As I read the reports on climate change, I recognize that humanity needs to refocus on their care of God's world.

Stewardship is not only about caring for plants and trees, animals, and waterways, it is also about caring for our neighbors, our cities, our society. I have watched over the last year or so as you have really stepped up your caring/stewardship. During the pandemic, your support whether monetary or hands on tripled at one point the number of meals shared with our hungry neighbors. You adapted programming so that VBS could continue.

You also welcomed and assisted in the adjustments to our new online format for worship. I'm not sure that many of you realize that our worship service is shared with about 20 people in southern Ohio. There are others outside our state and inside our city that we don't know personally but join with us on Sunday mornings to worship God. This, my friends, is called evangelism.

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I write all of this to tell you that your gifts of time and money have made a tremendous impact on the ministry of this church. You have been so faithful in your giving. Your gifts have touched so many lives not only inside our congregation but in the community and beyond. You have been such wonderful examples of what it means to be a good steward. I am proud and hopeful to stand with you as we look to the year 2022.

I want to invite you as you hear from the stewardship committee to consider how you can financially and personally support the growing ministries at FPC. How might you grow in your calling to be a steward for God? Stewardship is not all about money. It is about finding your calling and sharing your gifts in an effort to make God's world a stronger, healthier, more loving place.

Thank you for all you do. May God bless and keep you and those you hold dear.

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Try a new Thanksgiving Tradition

At Thanksgiving, we give thanks for things (food, home, clothing, work) and loved ones (family, friends, pets). But if the people we name aren't present, they may never know how precious they are to us. This November, start a new tradition by writing notes of thanks to people you appreciate.



Follow Paul's model of starting letters with thanksgiving: "First, I thank my God through Jesus Christ for all of you, because your faith is being reported all over the world" (Romans 1:8, NIV). Notice how he thanks his addressees by thanking God for them. Paul is specific too, not writing, "Thanks for everything!"

Expressing genuine thanksgiving to God and another person, you might write something like this:

Dear Judy,

This Thanksgiving I'm thinking about special people in my life. You are one! I thank God for our friendship, for your strong witness for Jesus and for your willingness to lend a hand as a substitute teacher. (Your chocolate cookies are icing on the cake!) I praise God for you!
